Building Networks to Alleviate Food Insecurity

WORKSHOP SUMMARY

This <u>interactive workshop</u> was designed to guide participants through the process of creating a food security "benefits resource guide" tailored to the location and populations they serve. Facilitators led activities designed to help family service providers immediately implement food security knowledge in their local communities. Using the Spectrum of Prevention framework, participants identified and and viewed programs and services in their communities in ways that can support efforts to reduce food insecurity among military families.

FOOD SECURITY RESOURCE GUIDE

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Educating Providers

- Soldier and Family Readiness Group briefs, especially before a deployment
- Food Banks that provide services to pantries & partner agencies. We do a presentation at our regional Food Bank Annual Summit
- Educate providers about the stereotype that its just low ranking members with lots of kids. One life event will knock anyone off the fence. A LTC or Col can be food insecure.

- Provider Town Halls. My team and I briefed the Child and Family Behavioral Health Providers during their morning huddle.
- We were sure to educate the nursing staff within our MTF (primary care) since they often are the ones initially able to detect (risk of) food insecurity
- We offer battalion and brigade-level Steering Committees
 the opportunity to use our food pantry and branch location
 to host meetings and a chance to educate them on our
 services in person.

Influencing Policy & Legislation

- MAZON is a national organization with a Veteran focus which directly lobbies congress
- There was money released just this week by the federal government to states for food banks etc
- There is growing interest in <u>developing food-related</u> <u>benefits and programs as part of Medicare and</u> <u>Medicaid</u>. This is just beginning but the agenda is being set.
- <u>State dietetic associations</u> generally have a public policy arm. Including them can bring in another advocate
- Medical insurance is paying for medically necessary meals
- There are companies that have a goal to help food insecure population, such as We Don't Waste.
- At a Unit level the commander can have a food policy letter. It can address worksite food and asking the food insecurity vital sign on all members with body composition issues.
- Our pantry participated in a county-level food policy council and it was a fantastic experience and opportunity.
